WHEREAS, F.B. Pease Company has made application pursuant to Henrietta Town Code Section 295-25[A](15) for a Special Use Permit to allow the keeping, storage, or holding of vehicles (the "Application") on Industrial Zoned property at 1450 East Henrietta Rd (the "Property"); and

WHEREAS, a public hearing was duly advertised and held relative to the same.

THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that pursuant to the State Environmental Quality Review Act, in accordance with the EAFs Parts 2 and 3, attached hereto and accepted and approved, the Application will not have a significant environmental impact and the Town Board issues a Negative Declaration relative to the Application.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that, during the administrative Site Plan process Engineering and Planning is requested to evaluate methods to minimize ground contamination; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the Town Board hereby approves Special Use Permit Application No. 2021-061, conditioned upon the following:

- 1. Junk or scrap vehicles may not be parked at the Property. As such, all vehicles parked at the Property must be registered and plated;
- 2. All vehicles must be parked on a paved surface (including, for example, concrete, asphalt, stone, millings) or otherwise kept indoors;
- 3. Vehicles must be kept in the area(s) indicated on the imagery last submitted as part of the application, attached hereto and made a part hereof;
- 4. Only passenger cars and trucks may be kept at the Property pursuant to this Permit;
- 5. Progress inspections will be performed, 1) on April 1, 2022 to evaluate progress towards clean-up of junk vehicles, and 2) on May 31, 2022 to evaluate progress toward repair of and additional parking. Clean up of junk vehicles shall be completed to the satisfaction of the Building Department by May 1, 2022. Parking shall be made safe and sufficient to the satisfaction of the Building Department by June 1, 2022; and
- 6. Vehicle sales business operations are not permitted at the Property. Vehicles shall not be displayed for sale at the Property. Signage shall not be used for the selling of vehicles at the Property, including signage attached to or displayed from the inside of the vehicles.
