On behalf of the Chair of the Historic Site Committee Helen Elam, I am requesting that the property at 1294 Lehigh Station Road, Henrietta, be added to the Eleventh Historic Site District, established in 1988.

Bonnie Kase sent an e-mail to me requesting that her property be added to the local historic site. If you need a copy of that e-mail, please let me know.

The following information was written by Virginia Bartos, NYS Office of Parks, Recreation & Historic Preservation.

Reasons for designation: "Constructed in the 1850's, the house is a farm residence of vertical wood plank construction, the first to be documented for the Town."

"The interior also retains historic features...lath and plaster walls and ceilings, wall and ceiling moldings, wood floors and an enclosed staircase."

"With most of its historic fabric intact, the house is an excellent example of mid-nineteenth century plank house construction and of how it was updated to fit the needs of the farm and family...the house is a rare surviving example of this construction method in the Town. The house is also a reminder of the Town's former agricultural past..."
