2017 WindStorm and Brush Pick-up

I would like to take this opportunity to thank all of our Department of Public Works (DPW) Staff for an outstanding job during our grand windstorm event. On Wednesday, March 8th 2017, they pushed over 100 trees off Henrietta roadways. The next morning they started to pick up the downed trees before receiving over 2 feet of snow the following Tuesday.

During the windstorm power outage, staff members worked tirelessly around the clock to make sure Henrietta's 8 sewer pump stations had generator power to keep our sewers operating.

As spring comes into full bloom, many projects around town are in the works or have already been completed.

The new heating, ventilation and air conditioning (HVAC) system for our town Library has been completed. Now underway is the renovation of the HVAC system in the Town Hall. This is expected to be completed this summer.

The mild winter allowed the DPW staff to install the base for the new road that will connect the Town Hall and the Recreation Center. During the month of April, the staff also completed ditching projects along Martin and Rush-Henrietta Town Line Roads. Road paving and sidewalk repairs will commence this summer.

The Recreation Center continues to be a very busy operation with lots of community support. Lawn installation work is currently underway.

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From the Supervisor continued

The Farmland Plan continues to move along with the committee coming back with recommendations in late fall. The multi-family moratorium has been extended for an additional 9 months. This allows the committee much needed time to also look at land use issues throughout the entire town including land use design standards, map overlay districts and other possible zoning criteria.

The Town Board has hired an architectural firm to outline library plans and construction drawings in order to establish a cost estimate for a new 32,000 square foot library proposal. We hope to put the new library proposal on the ballot for our resident's approval this election year.

Bob Morgan and Mike Spoleta have offered to donate the parcel just east of the new recreation center to house the proposed new library. This parcel is approximately 3 acres and fronts on Calkins Road.

Library News

Here at the library, we're busy with our everyday work—helping small ones learning how to talk and read, giving teens the tools they need to launch into the world, and supporting adults hitting the reset button on their lives in ways big and small. In 2016, we added 13,000 new items to our collection, and 217,000 people visited our library to check out over 387,000 items. To put that in daily terms, that's hundreds of people checking out around 1,300 items every single day we're open.



Our services targeted toward families are continuing to explode, with 21,598 people attending children's programs in 2016, a 20% increase over the previous year—a trend that seems to be continuing well into 2017. It's no wonder, with our ever-improving slate of offerings from Miss Annalise, Miss Laura, Miss Cathy, and Mr. Matthew. Over the last few months, they've debuted a Saturday Family LEGO program and a Baby Sign Language Play Group in addition to their usual selection of storytimes and programs for school-aged kids that are designed to develop critical thinking and other valuable skills in an informal, fun environment. We have something going on for families at the library almost every day. Visit our website or Facebook page for the most up-to-date information about what's going on.



This is a good moment to remind everyone that our programming is here for each and every member of our community. If you, a family member, or a friend needs sign language interpretation to fully enjoy one of our programs, please contact the library at least five days ahead of the program, and we can bring in a professional ASL interpreter. We're so grateful to the Friends of the Henrietta Library for funding this service. Our Friends also provide funding so we always have sign language interpreters at our Baby Storytime and All-Ages Storytime on the first Tuesday of every month. We are happy, of course, to provide reasonable accommodation anyone might need to attend our

Engineering Department

What's New in Henrietta

The Engineering Department has 60 private development projects that it is overseeing. 22 projects are in the Design Phase, 23 projects are in the Active Construction Phase and the remainder are in Post Construction. Some of the notable and more recent projects are:

- Plans for the proposed 94,000 square foot VA Rochester Community Based Outpatient Facility are moving forward. This much needed project is located at 272 Calkins Road between the Henrietta Ambulance and Interstate 390. Since the site plan is still going through the approval process, the tentative construction date will be sometime in 2018.
- The Delta Sonic Car Wash located at 2970 West Henrietta Road is going to demolish the existing restaurant at the corner of West Henrietta Road and Brighton Henrietta Town Line Road and construct a new 31,000 square foot service facility, convenience store and gas station. The project will also double the size of the existing car wash and provide additional landscaping; work is scheduled to begin this summer.
- Another project that is gearing up for construction is the Seidel Veterinary facility located at 5370 West Henrietta Road at the corner of Finn Road. This 3,600 square foot building will serve as a veterinary clinic.
- Jeremiah's of Henrietta will be taking over the former Perkins restaurant located at 1175 Jefferson Road. They are currently renovating the inside of the building and plan to open sometime this summer.
- The Hillside Family of Agencies is expanding their camp located at 2310 Lehigh Station Road. This new day-use recreation area will consist of cabins, a bath house and a common hall for dining. Work is tentatively scheduled to commence in May.
- Heritage Gardens is scheduled to begin construction in May or June of this year. The three story 26,765 square foot apartment building will consist of 83 units and will be located at 950 Commons Way.
- Town Center Apartments North and South are in the process of constructing a 124 and 249 unit apartment projects located between the Dome Arena and Veterans Memorial Park over the next several years.
- The Lehigh Station Road and East River Road multi-dwelling housing development is currently under design. The project consists of approximately 199 market rate units on the north side of Lehigh Station Road, 110 units of senior housing on the south side of the road, and 180 units for the hearing impaired also on the south side of Lehigh Station Road. This will be a multi-phased project over multiple years.
- The Life Storage self-storage facility located at 1270 Jefferson Road will be demolishing two existing buildings and constructing a three-story 56,000 square foot climate controlled building. They are currently going through the approval process and hope to start construction this summer.
- The Howlett Farms Subdivision located at the southeast corner of East River Road and Erie Station Road is a proposed 107 lot residential subdivision. This subdivision is in the middle of the review and approval process so the construction date is tentative.
- Glenbrooke Patio Homes (formerly East Henrietta Road Patio Homes) will be starting construction shortly. This 68 lot subdivision is located at the northeast corner of East Henrietta Road and Goodburlet Road and as part of this project, sidewalks will be provided on the east side of East Henrietta Road from Myrtlewood Drive to Goodburlet Road.

- Fox Field Subdivision, Section 1 is currently under construction at the end of Farrell Road Extension. This single family subdivision will consist of 53 residential lots and 47.3 acres of open space adjacent to the Genesee River.
- Riverton Parcel F, Section 3 is the last subdivision section for the residential development located off of Erie Station Road. This 30 lot subdivision is currently under construction.
- The Preserve, Section 10 is the last subdivision section for the residential development located at the end of York Bay Trail. This 15 lot subdivision is still going through the approval process and could break ground this summer.

Building and Fire Prevention

Spring is always a time when we're recovering from winter and have many projects to do around the home. Please contact the Building dept. before starting any home project that will require a permit from the Town. These include, but are not limited to: sheds, decks, pools, additions, major plumbing, structural work, renovations, etc. If you're not sure if you need a permit, do not hesitate to contact us. This will save you time & money and most of all emotional distress if you find out after the project has begun. We are here to make sure you, the resident, are protected by ensuring the work you do yourself or the contractor you hire, can meet the NYS Building Code. There are many changes in the most recent version of the Code, in particular the Energy Code, Plumbing and the Electrical Code. This always becomes an issue when the homeowner tries to sell their home and the bank sees that there were improvements to the property from the original construction. If permits were not issued, it complicates the matter and can result in you losing out on a sale. Our turnaround time for permits is approx. 8-10 days, up to 2 weeks if necessary due to the volume of plans submitted.

Many residents ask about open burning of yard debris. The NYS DEC has issued an Open Burning ban from now through the month of May. This is to reduce the chance of wildfires starting because of unattended fires. It is enforceable by an \$8000.00/day fine by the DEC if found in violation. In Monroe County, open burning has been banned since 1994, by order of the Monroe County Health Department. We will follow up with the DEC to enforce this regulation.



With summer upon us, we get numerous questions about Recreational Fires, the NYS Fire Code addresses this subject. Basically, it allows these fires as long as they do not impact the neighboring properties through smoke or smell. Not all residents like the smell of smoke. Some may have allergies; some do not want the smoke smell on their clothes from an open window. Please check with your neighbors to see if they have objections to your use of a recreational fire. Henrietta Dog Park Update

The new 1,200 lb. electro-magnetic gate locks are up and running at the Henrietta Dog Park! With these new gate locks installed, the dog park is now accessible with a card. Now that we are issuing the cards, we've gathered some frequently asked questions we'd like to answer:

- **Can I put a hole punch in the card?**

Monroe County Parks Department has tested punching a hole in the middle of one of the short sides along the edge and after doing so, the access card still worked. However, we still recommend getting a sleeve to put the card in, because if you punch a hole in the card you do so at your own risk; if the card becomes damaged and no longer works, the \$20.00 fee to replace the card would apply. An additional tip for you to consider is that the cards will typically read through a wallet or small billfold, which would prevent you from having to repeatedly take the card out and risk losing it.

- **Do the cards need to be kept away from cell phones or other electronic devices?**

Monroe County Parks Department has advised that access cards do not need to be kept away from other cards or magnets.

- **How do I get an additional card?**

To protect the integrity of the Dog Parks, ONE swipe card is issued. Upon request, ONE additional swipe card may be purchased for an additional \$20 from the Monroe County Parks Department at 171 Reservoir Ave in Highland Park or you can call 753-PARK (8:30 am to 4:30 pm). There is no additional charge for households with two or more memberships. There is a maximum of two swipe cards issued per household. Lost/Damaged card replacements are \$20 per card.



As a reminder, in order to help keep the Henrietta Dog Park safe for our furry friends, please make sure the gate closes behind you when entering and exiting the park.

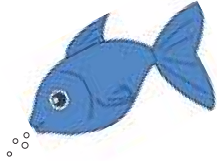

Did you know that during the last weekend of June anyone can fish the waters of New York State and no license is required? The free fishing weekend is a great opportunity to try it out for the first time or, if you haven't gone in a few years, to remember the pleasure of fishing once again!

After the Free Fishing Weekend, those over the age of 16 need to have a fishing license. For New York State residents, annual fishing licenses cost \$25.00 for ages 16-69 and \$5.00 for ages 70+. You can purchase fishing licenses here in the Town Clerk's Office during regular office hours, Monday through Friday, 9:00 a.m. to 5:00 p.m. You may be eligible for a free or reduced fee license if you are active-duty military or a military veteran with 40% or more service-related disability. From the Town Historian

Henrietta Bicentennial 1818-2018

At this year's Memorial Day Parade, look for Henrietta's replica log cabin with a banner saying "Henrietta – Bicentennial 1818-2018". This log cabin was created by members of the town's Parks and Facilities Department as a prompt to help all of us think about the earliest settlers who came to this area.



During the Revolutionary War, soldiers, most of whom were farmers, became familiar with the land in central and western New York. Their farms at home were located on the rocky soil of the New England states. This soil was becoming worn out and depleted. When the soldiers returned home, they would remember the vast meadows, rolling hills and beautiful lakes of this area.

George Washington ordered The Sullivan Campaign of 1779 in retaliation for the Mohawk and Seneca support of the British during the Revolutionary War. General Washington also wanted to end the raiding parties that were sent out by the tribes. Nearly sixty Native American villages were destroyed, including their crops and livestock. The area east of the Genesee River was then considered to be safer for settlement.

The land in western New York was claimed by the Dutch, the French and the British, but those claims were no longer valid after the Revolutionary War. The Treaty of Hartford, Connecticut, 1786, granted Massachusetts the right to sell the land and New York State was granted jurisdiction. A group of investors headed by Oliver Phelps and Nathaniel Gorham purchased 6 million acres of land. Phelps and Gorham were required to negotiate with the Iroquois Confederacy for their rights to the land which they did through the Treaty at Buffalo Creek in 1788.



According to the *Pioneer History of Phelps and Gorham Purchase* by O. Turner, published 1851, 'Major Isaac Scott settled in the southwest corner of Township 12, 7th Range in 1790 (later named Henrietta) and built a log house.' The land was part of Ontario County, town of Northfield. Major Scott did not stay. According to Orsamus Turner, 'It was a hard region to begin in, desirable as it would now seem; the lands were most of them flat, wet and heavily timbered'.

The next pioneers of record were Jesse Pangburn, and Lyman and Warren Hawley who came in 1806. That same year, Charles Rice, William Thompson, Moses Goodale, Thomas Sparks, George Dickinson, Sela(h) Reed, Asa Champlin and Gideon Griswold are listed as purchasing land. These early settlers would construct log houses as homes, schools and meeting places for their churches.

The knowledge for building a log house or log cabin probably came from the Swedish or Finnish people who had a tradition of constructing wooden buildings. The settlement of New Sweden was founded along the Delaware River in 1638. One of the supporters of the colony was Peter Minuit. The Dutch, under the leadership of Peter Stuyvesant, took over the colony in 1655. Both men were leaders in New Amsterdam which later became New York.

It would have been too expensive and the sailing ships that brought colonists to America were too small to carry building supplies. The early pioneers traveled on foot or horseback through areas where trails were narrow, if they existed at all. Again, they would not have chosen to carry building materials with them. However, they would bring an axe. It was possible for one man to build a log cabin in two week's time. If he was working alone, because of the weight of the logs, he would have been able to build a one story cabin that was six to eight feet high. He would have been unable to lift the heavy logs any higher. Log cabins could be constructed without nails. Nails were made by blacksmiths and were expensive and heavy to transport.

The log cabins had one door and if it had windows they were covered with a wooden shutter or an animal skin. If it was available, paper was covered in animal fat to make the paper translucent and waterproof for use in the window area.

The fireplaces were constructed at one end of the cabin and provided heat, light and an area for cooking. The spaces between the logs were 'chinked' or filled in with clay or cloth to help weatherproof the cabin. Most of the time, the floors were beaten earth. Some men would split logs and lay the boards flat side up to create a wooden floor. If the roofs were high enough, a loft was built for sleeping.

Township 12, Range 7 was known as the West Woods of Pittsford in 1814, because the area was so heavily forested. There was plenty of building material to construct a log home and the clay soil was useful for chinking. It was the hard work, endurance, ingenuity and tenacity of the early pioneers that built our town.

In 2017 and 2018, the log cabin will be located at events throughout Henrietta. We will be sharing the history of the growth of this community.

We hope you will share your history with us as well.

Parks and Recreation

Please note that our Parks and Recreation Department main office is no longer located at Town Hall. We are now located at the new Recreation Center, which opened this past January. The Recreation Center address is 605 Calkins Road, located in Veterans Memorial Park. All Recreation staff phone numbers and contact information has remained the same.

Interested in reserving a park cabin or pavilion? **Residents are now able to reserve cabins and pavilions 365 days in advance** (Non-Residents 335 days in advance). This new policy will help to avoid long lines for reservations and will be more conducive for your event planning. You can also request to reserve a cabin or pavilion online. Simply visit our online registration page at <https://parksandrecreation.henrietta.org> and click the “parks facilities” tab at the top of the page for more information. Cabin key pickup/return is now taking place at the Recreation Center and is no longer done at the DPW dispatch office.

PROGRAM UPDATE – Summer Swim Lessons will now be offered through Rush-Henrietta Continuing Education rather than the Town Recreation Department. This is primarily due to keeping instructional swim programming consistent throughout the year under one entity. On April 2nd through April 4th, Henrietta Recreation Department staff attended the New York State Recreation and Park Society's 77th Annual Conference and Awards Ceremony which was held at the Hyatt Regency Hotel in Rochester. Earlier this year, the Recreation Department applied for the NYSRPS Easton Foundations Explore Archery grant and during the conference awards ceremony, was awarded the grant.



Henrietta is one of six communities in New York state who were selected to receive the grant which includes: (12) Easton Genesis compound bows, arrows, targets, supplies and equipment as well as a 2-day instructor training/certification course for (2) staff. Recreation Supervisors Anita Tichacek and Craig Ross will travel this May to the City of Oneida, NY to receive their Explore Archery instructor certifications.

The Recreation Department is offering the new Explore Archery program this summer for individuals ages 8 years and older. 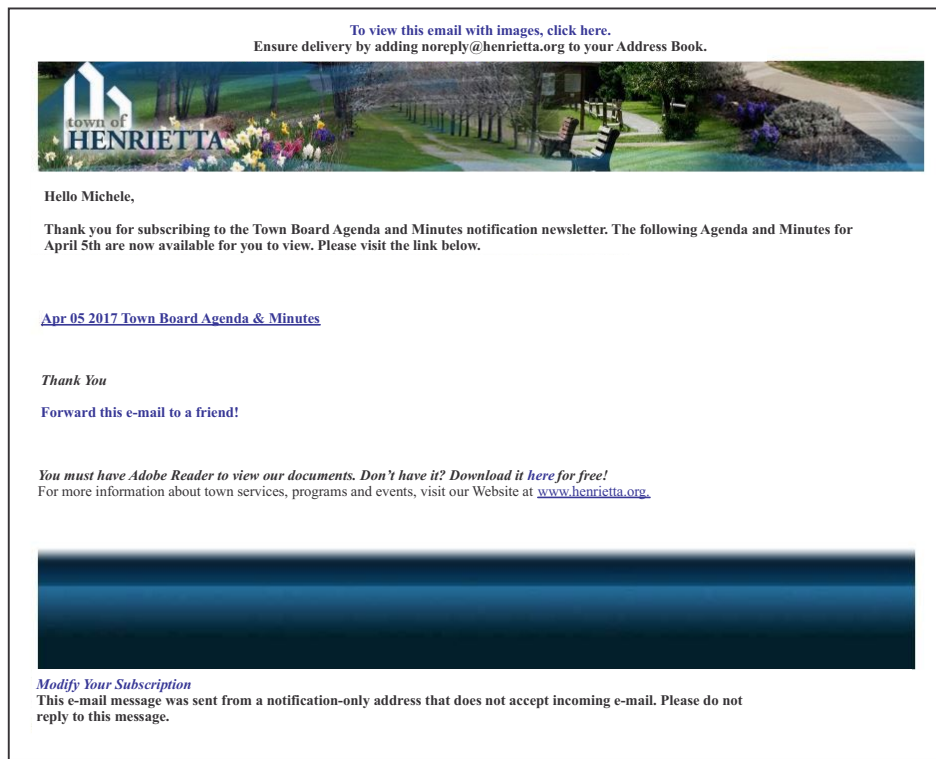

Department of Public Works

The month of March presented the worst weather of the winter. Town crews responded immediately to trees down as a result of the windstorm and had all town roads open and passable before dark that night. The next two days were spent removing debris left behind from clearing the roads to our debris site on Martin Road. During the same three days, plans were put together to organize a mass pick up of debris left behind in the yards of town residents. That work commenced the week after 2 feet of snow fell, burying most of the debris piles. Our crews worked the next four weeks picking up debris left at the curb by residents and opened up our drop off site daily on Martin Road. This type of work is something the town rarely does and specialized equipment had to be rented to assist with the debris removal. Thank you to all of the town residents for their patience while the work was being done.

SUMMER JOB OFFERINGS- All of the Public Works Departments will soon have seasonal jobs available to anyone over the age of 18. These jobs offer employment Monday thru Friday 7:00 a.m. til 3:30 p.m. for twenty weeks. Hourly rates start at \$9.70 per hour. If you are a student with no job plans between semesters or a recent graduate that is looking for summertime employment, these jobs are perfect for you. Students are not the only people to benefit from these opportunities; retirees, night shift workers or anyone looking for part-time work and are available to work daytime hours are welcome to apply. Interested parties should call 359-7005 for more information or applications are available on the town's website. The jobs will be available any time after May 1st, 2017.

Work has begun to repair the lawn damage from this past winter. Crews will be going through the town, to address any grass damaged by our plows. If you have a large area to be restored please contact the Highway department at 359-7005 so we can better plan that work schedule.



This time of year also poses many questions regarding driveway improvements. If you simply wish to resurface an existing blacktop driveway or pave a gravel driveway, without changing its width or location, no permit is required. If you are planning to widen an existing driveway or add a turnaround (changes to town code concerning driveways became effective January 1, 2012), your contractor must obtain a permit from the Highway Superintendent. Please call the town at 359-7005 for details on the process.

2017 - PAVING PROGRAM – repairs to catch basins, gutters and crossover pipes has also begun to prepare for the paving program for the summer. Updates to the program will be posted on our website weekly. The first round of paving will be to mill and pave all of the side roads off of Authurs Avenue. Weather permitting, the milling will tentatively start on May 17th and the paving on May 22nd.

Henrietta Ambulance has changed its name to CHS Mobile Integrated Health Care, Inc.

Exciting changes are happening at Henrietta Ambulance. Our local town ambulance has joined forces with two neighboring town agencies to further strengthen itself with a locally-based ambulance service in the town. The combined agency is now called CHS Mobile Integrated Health Care, Inc. This project has been in the works for two years. The recent change broadens the availability of EMS resources to include EMTs and paramedics all from local ambulance stations.

Starting last December, all 911 calls for medical care in our community have been routed to the newly combined agency which consists of members and career staff from all three towns (Henrietta, Chili, and Wheatland) as well as the Village of Scottsville.

Our goal was, and will continue to be, to provide a prompt, quality EMS response from locally based resources. When you dial 911 and request an ambulance, you will receive the same compassionate, timely care you have come to expect. However, the lettering on the ambulance itself may say Henrietta, Chili or Scottsville. The membership of all agencies has been combined. The caregivers coming to your side are the same regardless of which ambulance responds to your emergency.

With the goal of ensuring long-term sustainability of a locally-based Emergency Medical Service, the merger represents a lot of hard work by our elected officials and EMS agency leadership. In 2016, 26 ambulance agencies in New York State permanently closed their doors. Our cooperative venture assures that you will have access to local ambulance service for years to come. We've combined our forces and changed our name, but our core values remain the same. We look forward to continuing to provide you with compassionate and timely care.
